Mayor Mills read the title of the Resolution into the record.

Acting City Manager Falconburg introduced Administrative Services Director Karen Borkowski Surine.

Administrative Services Director Karen Borkowski Surine presented a Resolution requesting the appointment of Deputy Relief Judges. Section 8.2 of the City Charter requires Council to appoint a Presiding Judge and a Deputy Judge. These judges have contracts requiring them to work a certain number of days in the courtroom. These judges have other commitments and when there is a conflict, emergency or illness, the court relies on relief judges for coverage. To qualify to be a relief judge, you must be an attorney at law eligible to practice in Colorado, have five years of experience and must have judicious experience. Applications were received and a committee consisting of Judge Kristin Brown, Court Administrator Michelle Ramos and Assistant Director of General Services Ruth DeCrescentis interviewed the applicants and recommend the appointment of Melissa Beato, Charles Peters and Michelle Kline as On-call Deputy Municipal Judges.

If none of the candidates receives over 50% of the votes cast, a Run-off election will be held on May 26, 2020 between the top two candidates. This Resolution calls for the Run-off election on May 26, 2020 if necessary. City Clerk Hoel answered questions from Council regarding:

- A drop off location for ballots.*
- The ability to certify the candidate at the April 30, 2020 Special City Council meeting if a run-off is not necessary.*
- The date the elected candidate could be seated on Council if a run-off election is necessary.*
- There not being a need for a run-off election when there are at least three candidates running.*

10. UTILITIES BUSINESS ITEMS

Ordinances

A. AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BRIGHTON, COLORADO, AMENDING SECTION 2.F. OF ORDINANCE 2305 REGARDING THE BRIGHTON CUSTOMER ASSISTANCE PROGRAM (FIRST READING)

Mayor Mills read the title of the Ordinance into the record.

Acting City Manager Falconburg introduced Finance Director Maria Ostrom.

Finance Director Maria Ostrom explained that the City is trying to help its water customers during this time by making changes to the Brighton Customer Assistance Program. At this time, Almost Home administers the program for the City and it is open to all Brighton water customers facing a financial hardship. A person can receive up to \$300.00 in vouchers for their water bill. The customer would only receive a voucher for the amount of their bill that month, but they could apply for a voucher several times per year. The proposal is to have the Utility Billing staff administer vouchers as well as Almost Home to add more ways for the customer to access the program. An online application has been placed on the website and the City is currently accepting those applications. Customers still have access to the program even though City Hall is closed. One change is that a customer could receive a one-time credit that remains on the account until it is used. If a customer does have a credit and the customer moves out of the City, the credit is not refundable. If a customer has tampered with their water meter in the past twelve months, they are not eligible for the program. Director Ostrom answered questions from Council regarding:

- The applicant still being screened by the Almost Home staff.*
- The set of qualifiers being income based.*
- A cap being set for the money in the fund.*
- The percentage of poverty level in the City.*
- The funds being sufficient to help everyone in need.*

Motion by Councilmember Watts, seconded by Councilmember Humbert, to approve the Ordinance. Motion passed by the following vote:

B. AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BRIGHTON, COLORADO, AMENDING, FOR TWO MONTHLY BILLING CYCLES, CERTAIN SECTIONS OF CHAPTERS 13 AND 14, REGARDING WATER, WASTEWATER AND STORM DRAINAGE RATES, FEES AND CHARGES ASSESSED BY THE CITY OF BRIGHTON; SETTING FORTH EFFECTIVE DATES FOR SAID RATES, FEES AND CHARGES; AND OTHER DETAILS RELATED THERETO (FIRST READING)

Mayor Mills read the title of the Ordinance into the record.

Acting City Manager Falconburg introduced Finance Director Maria Ostrom.

Finance Director Maria Ostrom presented an Ordinance regarding a temporary reduction in Utility rates to help water customers. This will cover bills that would have been generated in April and May. The bill would be held and one bill would be sent in May for an extra-long cycle that would not be due until June 1, 2020 or later. There has been criticism in the past regarding long cycles because they would negatively affect the customers, but in this case, a long cycle is beneficial. Staff is proposing that all of the water usage during this cycle be billed at \$2.58 per 1,000 gallons regardless of the length of the cycle and the amount of water used. Because no bill is sent in April and the bill will be sent in May and due in June, the customers would see a reduction in their fixed fees because only one month of fixed fees will appear on their bill. There will not be any late fees added until June 30, 2020 so staff can work with customers while they are waiting for stimulus checks, unemployment benefits and for the economy to restart. These changes would result in an average savings of \$45.38 over the combined bill period for water customers. This would result in a one-time revenue loss, but staff has been working on ways to offset some of the revenue loss. The meter reading function has been folded into Utility Billing and that process has been streamlined. This has resulted in the elimination of one full-time employee position. Staff has been working on streamlining the utility maintenance operations and one full-time employee position was eliminated from this area. Both of these positions were vacancies so nobody lost their job. Director Ostrom explained that a mistake was made in Section 5 of the Ordinance and asked that a motion be made to amend this section. The intent is for all customers, all categories, and all classes to pay \$2.58 per 1,000 gallons regardless of the amount consumed. Director Ostrom answered questions from Council regarding:

- The plan to communicate this program to the community.*
- This program covering the months of May and June.*
- This program shorting the three funds by \$670,000.*
- A customer being able to pay their bill and not waiting until June.*
- The reason for the program to help residents that are not able to pay their bill.*

Motion by Mayor Pro Tem Johnston, seconded by Councilmember Humbert, to approve the Ordinance as amended. Motion passed by the following vote:

B. A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BRIGHTON, COLORADO, IN SUPPORT OF THE NATIONAL LEAGUE OF CITIES' LEADING TOGETHER CITIES AGENDA FOR THE 2020 U.S. PRESIDENTIAL ELECTION

Mayor Mills read the title of the Resolution into the record.

Acting City Manager Falconburg explained that this item was brought back from the National League of Cities Conference by City Council and is being approved across the United States.

Mayor Mills explained that the National League of Cities created a campaign last fall called Leading Together. Local elected officials need to lead together and come together on important common issues. Council is asking that during the Presidential Election, no matter whom you are supporting, that everyone lead together in unity.

Motion by Councilmember Watts, seconded by Councilmember Humbert, to approve Resolution 2020-38. Motion passed by the following vote:

C. Letter to Federal Legislators

Mayor Mills explained that as the City, Council would like to send a letter to local legislators to encourage more funding that would help those citizens at the local level.

Acting City Manager Falconburg introduced Strategic Initiatives and Governmental Affairs Manager Nicole Samson.

Strategic Initiatives and Governmental Affairs Manager Nicole Samson explained that this letter thanks our Federal Representatives and Congressman for passing the CARES Act but explains that there are some issues that come before local government that need to be addressed. The letter would request that the legislators ask federal agencies for guidance asking for the grants to specifically include as eligible items like laptops, VPN's, licensing agreements, and temporary staffing. Manager Samson answered questions from Council regarding:

- A Specific department needing temporary employees due to positive COVID-19 tests.

Motion by Councilmember Watts, seconded by Councilmember Jordinelli, to approve Item 11C. Motion passed by the following vote:

D. City Manager Executive Search Firm Discussion

Administrative Services Director Karen Borkowski Surine explained that ten search firms were contacted and asked to submit proposals and five of the firms submitted proposals. Bids of \$25,000 or less are not required to go through the formal bid process. All of the information was sent to City Council and Mayor Mills and Mayor Pro Tem Johnston conducted interviews of the firms. The rest of City Council indicated they were interested in contacting the firms so that information was provided. Staff let the firms know that other Councilmembers may be reaching out to speak to them regarding their proposal. Director Surine asked for direction from Council regarding the next steps.

Councilmember Cushing explained that he would be reaching out to the firms this week.

City Council asked that this discussion be brought to the next Study Session and that a vote should be taken at the next City Council meeting.
